Foreign Relations of the United States Historical Book Series and DoD Office of Security Review (OSR) Responsibilities

The Foreign Relations of the United States (FRUS) series, produced by the U.S. Department of State (DoS), Office of the Historian, presents the official unclassified documentary historical record of major U.S. foreign policy decisions and significant diplomatic activity available in hard cover book and on-line formats IAW 22 USC 4353.

Under the auspices of this U.S. Code, *OSR* is the sole Department of Defense designee for public release determinations of previously classified DoD foreign policy documents identified for inclusion because they contain DoD equities with major U.S. foreign policy decisions and significant diplomatic activity. Sometimes OSR must request other DoD subject matter experts to assist with completing these important statutory reviews on time.

Timeframes for completion of such reviews are mandated by 22 USC 4353 for completion within 120 days of submission for initial DoD review or 60 days for a DoS appeal. As a result, FRUS reviews are handled by OSR as a priority so that the resulting release determination will ensure compliance with the U.S. Code, and provide an accurate picture of DoD's involvement in significant U.S. historical foreign policy decisions while ensuring national security information is protected.

The FRUS series began in 1861 [sic] and now comprises more than 400 volumes containing documents from the National Security Council, the Central Intelligence Agency, the Department of State, the U.S. Agency for International Development, Presidential libraries, and sometimes private diplomatic papers, as well as DoD documents.
